Situation Overview

With the devastating effect of the tropical cyclones Judy and Kevin, the Government of Vanuatu announced and declared state of emergency for all islands of Vanuatu on the 2nd of March 2023 (for the next 6 months). This meant that all government ministries planning and programs are on hold or suspended and the country operates under the authority, planning and program of the National Disaster Management Office. The Director General of the Ministry of Education and Training (MoET) activated the Emergency Operating Center (EOC) on the 7th of March to coordinate disaster response to affected provinces.

NDMO led with the assistance of MoET - selected 47 MoET officers to conduct an immediate rapid assessment to gather information on the number of schools damaged, the number of schools used as evacuation shelters, the number of schools ready to re-open, as well as details of schools currently used as evacuation shelters with the identified support needed by evacuees to be able to move out of the school facilities so schools could resume.

Mr. William Nasak's appointment as liaison officer between MoET and NDMO was crucial to ensuring that MoET EOC coordination adhered to NDMO guidelines and protocols. There were also appointment of MOET reps to various other clusters to ensure needs of the schools are taken to and addressed through the clusters. MoET continues to support NDMO through education cluster meetings and has coordinated six meetings to date.

Currently, the MoET EOC has an internal EOC plan (Annex 1) that is outlined by key activities that guides the daily tasking priorities and operations. Currently staff deployment to provinces and outer islands to undertake detailed assessment of schools in Shefa and other provinces in order to provide timely coordinated support to schools. These exercises will also identify affected and undamaged schools, as well as their readiness to resume operations. MoET detail assessment (Annex 6) is required to provide data that will meet complex educational requirements due to disaster response now and continuous improvement for the future.

Thirty-two schools in Port Vila and Efate have confirmed and reported damage, necessitating tents and other means for temporary learning spaces. teachers have reported been affected by the TCs.

There is also indication that 29 rural and urban schools on Efate are serving as safe shelters.

The number of teachers and students impacted by the cyclone based on the OV report has yet to be confirmed on Open VEMIS and the MoET team has yet to complete detailed assessments.

The number of damaged VSATs in schools, wash facilities and other school assets are still to be confirmed, quantified and costed.

In the MoET office buildings, the scholarship office has sustained damage as well the sky garden building owned by the Ministry. Added to these are the issue of water leakages, minor vehicle damaged and power outage.

Furthermore, MoET EOC is also committed to support 302 new Vanuatu Government Scholarship student who are studying in country to ensure that they resume studies and are supported accordingly as well.

General Coordination

The Emergency Operating Center (EOC) was activated on March 7th by the Director General of the Ministry of Education and Training to assess damages and coordinate disaster response in affected provinces.

The MoET EOC is hosted within the MoET conference room and briefings are held daily at 8 am and 4 pm respectively. With immediate assessment and priority to support most affected provinces and islands within Shefa and Tafea .

Monday 6th March at 3:00 p.m., power was restored to the Ministry EOC, however telecommunications is still highly affected and some staff have their homes still affected which causes some delays in the MoET-EOC fully operationalization.

EOC receives and documents daily updates from within MoET EOC and external MoET Cluster activities (Annex 2). However, the number of schools ready to open is yet to be confirmed. With the exception of the provinces of Shefa (all areas), Tafea (all areas), Malampa (south Malekula), Penama (south Pentecost), Sanma (south Santo, North West, and West Coast), and Torba (Merelava), schools in provinces not affected by tropical cyclones are open or more ready to be open.

To date, the number of affected schools in Shefa Province have mostly been identified. Currently 32 schools out of 235 have been confirmed to be damaged and require tents. 29 of them are also used as evacuation centers and will require shelter, food, and a gender cluster intervention in order for schools to re-open safely. These numbers might increase once all assessments are completed in the coming days. Additionally, to ensure the safety and well-being of the displaced students and potential families, inter-clusters approach is vital at this moment for immediate response and speedy disaster DUCA

recovery.
